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## About CHIEF

CHIEF (The Cultural Heritage and Identities of Europe's Future) aims to build an effective dialogue between different stakeholders in order to facilitate a future of Europe based on inclusive notions of cultural heritage and identity. The project focuses on the production and transition of cultural knowledge in both formal educational settings initiated from above, and a variety of informal human interactions. CHIEF will contribute to understanding and enhancing cultural literacy for young people, and the project will lead to more effective use of European cultural heritage as a site of production, translation and exchange of heterogeneous cultural knowledge. It will also help to recognise existing innovative practices and develop a new organisational model to enhance the cultural and inter-cultural competence of young Europeans.

## Overview

The database of academic and policy literature brings together academic and policy literature related to young people's cultural literacy education identified by CHIEF partner teams in Croatia, Georgia, Germany, India, Latvia, Slovakia, Spain, Turkey, and the United Kingdom. This literature was identified through the review processes conducted by each partner team for D1.2 the national policy and academic literature reviews. More information about the methodologies used in this process is available within the D1.2 national reports.

Separate databases have been created for policy and academic literature, and each is organised by country as well as being searchable by keywords. In addition to bibliographic information, each entry contains a summary of content and, in the case of academic literature, an overview of the key findings. In the case of policy documents, an overview of policy recommendations is provided. Copies of the forms used to collect the data for the entries are available at Appendix 1 and Appendix 2. A common set of keywords, identified inductively, were applied to the entries collectively to enhance the searchability of the database across national sets of entries.

## Summary of Entries

Table 1 provides a summary of the number of entries collated by each partner team. It shows that the database comprises a total of 398 individual entries.
